WE TROUBLE-SHOOT YOUR WEDDING DAY QUERIES

I would really love to wear a pair of strappy, high-heeled sandals at my summer wedding, but ever since a skiing accident earlier this year the toenails on my left foot have been heavily ridged and discoloured – not even regular pedicures have improved them.

Do I have any other options apart from wearing closed-toe shoes?

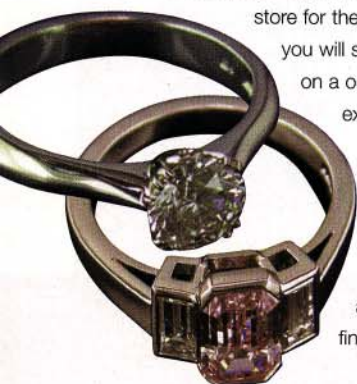
Not every apparently immaculately nail-polished foot is the real deal: our spies tell us that certain regulars in the celeb pages of *Now* are taking a crafty short-cut to salon-perfect toes with stick-on French pedicure nails. Kiss Fashion Toenail Accents kit (£8.99; available from Boots nationwide) contains all you need to transform the look of your toenails, including false nails for each toe, plus adhesive. Just push down your toenail cuticles with the orange stick provided (this helps the false nail grip the surface of the real nail more easily), glue them on, wait for them to set, then trim and file into shape and you're ready to glide down the aisle in those killer sandals.

My fiancé and I would like to design our own wedding rings, but aren't the most creative people in the world. Do you know of any companies that can help us devise a beautiful design and have it made up.

The Wedding Ring Workshop have come up with the solution for every individualistic but inspiration-poor couple looking for unique wedding rings. Their Wedding Ring Workshop allows you to visit them in their Hatton Garden

store for the day, during which you will spend time working on a one-off design with

experienced jewellers, get your hands dirty smelting the metal and milling and shaping your rings before filing, buffing and polishing the finished article.



As you congratulate yourselves on your work with a glass of Champagne over lunch, the rings will be sent to the London Assay Office for hall marking and engraving, ready for collection at a later date. Two rings in 18ct gold cost £600; two platinum rings cost £1,150; diamonds and precious stones are available at extra cost. Fashionable London jewellers Wint & Kidd (020 7908 9990) also offer a bespoke ring design service that allows you to choose your stone and collaborate with their in-house design team in creating a beautiful setting for it. They specialise solely in diamonds, and have a huge range in every cut and colour imaginable (their work is shown below left), so this is the place to head for if you'd like a gob-stopper of a pink diamond on your finger, à la Jennifer Lopez. For designs with an Art Deco feel, try Brighton jeweller G&G's bespoke service (01273 732492/ [www.ggjewellery.co.uk](http://www.ggjewellery.co.uk)). Edinburgh's Hamilton & Inches (0131 225 4898) and Herefordshire's Harriet Kelsall (01462 790 565/[www.hkjewellery.co.uk](http://www.hkjewellery.co.uk)) will also design to a specific brief.

My fiancé and I both come from Newcastle but are holding our wedding in London, where we now live and work. Although we're pretty organised, we're finding it hard to stay on top of all the wedding organisation as we work long hours and, as our families are back up north, there aren't many people we can delegate tasks to. We don't have the budget to hire a wedding organiser to oversee everything but would love to be able to offload specific tasks as and when we need to. Are there any companies out there who offer this kind of service?


As much as most women enjoy planning their wedding, plenty would agree that it also brings with it a fair amount of stress. London-based company Buy Time aims to provide just the kind of service you're looking for. Rather than being run on a membership or subscription

basis, it allows you to tell them exactly what level of help you need, with whatever task, and pay for that help alone. They charge by the hour (£35 per hour) rather than by the job; if you buy blocks of time you'll benefit from a discount (£290 for 10 hours; £500 for 20 hours). Their service is aimed at anyone who is short of time and they've had loads of experience in assisting couples organise their wedding; in the past they've helped out with everything from sourcing and purchasing specific wedding services or supplies, organising and co-ordinating various elements of the day, through to attending on the big day itself to make sure everything runs smoothly. You pay for as little or as much support as you need, whether you're looking for someone to project-manage the whole wedding or just someone to source a suitable caterer.
